The refrain of that song is the title I have chosen for this pastoral letter to the good people of both St. Joseph's and Michael's Parishes in Fall River, MA.

"O Come Let us Adore Him" is the invitation given to all humanity at the announcement of the birth of the Son of God, our Savior, Jesus Christ. It is also the invitation to continue to adore the same Christ in the Most Blessed Sacrament. the Most Holy Eucharist.

As the angels announced the great joy to the shepherds in Bethlehem, so too, do I announce that on the first Monday of Advent, Nov. 30,

After months of praying and discerning, I believe now is the time for this important next step in the revitalization and renewal of our parishes, and it is my hope that every parishioner will take the opportunity to encounter our Lord in this most beautiful way adoring our Lord in the Eucharist.

"Their eyes were opened and they recognized Him in the breaking of the Bread."

On Easter Sunday Night, two of our Lord's disciples were heading home on the road to Emmaus, filled with grief and disappointment at the death of Jesus. As they were walking along, Jesus appeared to them, but they didn't recognize Him. It wasn't until they were at table together that evening that they recognized Him in the "Breaking of the Bread," the term used for the Eucharist in the early Church. One could naturally ask, how did they not recognize Him as they were walking and talking with Him? How is that possible?



One could also ask why it was that they only recognized Him when He blessed and broke bread that evening? I would suggest that there are probably many of us who fail to recognize the presence of Christ in our lives, but there is something very profound, something undeniable when we are before our Lord in the Eucharist that deeply touches our hearts. It is Him! HE is truly and really present there.

Our Lord wants us to recognize Him in the Eucharist as well. He wants our hearts to burn within us as we spend time with Him in prayer, in particular in Eucharistic Adoration, where we kneel before Him in quiet meditation and reflection, allowing our Lord to open our eyes and speak to our hearts. Come, adore Him! Be with Him.

How to Pray in Adoration

Coming to adore our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament is one of the most powerful ways to pray. It is an opportunity for intimate conversation with Jesus, much like His first disciples who sat at His feet along the shore of the Sea of Galilee, like the beloved disciple John who rested his head on our Lord's chest at the Last Supper. It is a personal encounter with Him who loves us and desires to speak to us as friends, to speak directly to our hearts, to heal our brokenness and to strengthen our faith. Simply said, adoration is a personal conversation with Jesus Christ in the silence of our hearts. Practically speaking, it is important to maintain a spirit of silence in the adoration chapel for our own prayer and also so as not to disturb others.

- Silently Listen
- Read the Bible
- Pray the Rosary
- Spiritual Reading
- Liturgy of the Hours
- Pray for others
- Novenas
- Examine your conscience

In his final encyclical letter of his life, the great Pope Saint John Paul II, wrote, Ecclesia de Eucharistia, in which he sought to "rekindle Eucharistic amazement" among the faithful. He explained that, "to contemplate Christ involves being able to recognize Him wherever He manifests Himself, but above all in the living Sacrament of His Body and Blood. The Church draws her life from Christ in the Eucharist. By Him she is fed and by Him she is enlightened." In the beautiful letter, our beloved late Holy Father draws our attention to the reality that the Eucharist is both the "Source and the Summit of Christian life." He reminds us that in the Eucharist, our Lord fulfills His promise to always be with us. In the Euchatist, Jesus Christ is truly present to us, it is His Real Presence, not a sign or a symbol, but really Him!

I would like to speak now personally about the impact that Pope Saint John Paul II has had on my life and on my priesthood. Not only his teachings and writings, but by his personal witness of holiness, his deep prayer and his love and devotion to our Lord in the Eucharist. I was blessed to be a student in Rome the last years of his life, and although eldery and infirm, the reverence with which he celebrated Holy Mass and knelt in profound adoration are images that I will never forget. I invite you to look through the pictures of him saying Mass or kneeling in prayer before our Lord in the Eucharist. It is abundately clear that he is in deep conversation with the Lord whom he knew and loved deeply and desired for each of us to have a share in the relationship with our Lord. I pray that through the intercession of John Paul the Great, that each of you would profoundly experience our Lord in Adoration.
